First Reading: Micah 6:1-8 (CEB)

With the mountains and the foundations of the earth as the jury, God brings a lawsuit against Israel. God has “wearyed” Israel with a long history of saving acts. God does not want or expect lavish sacrifices to attempt to earn divine favor. Rather God empowers the people to do justice, to love loyalty to God, and to walk shrewdly in God’s service.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:18-31 (CEB)


According to the world's standards of power and might, the message of the cross seems stupid and offensive. Yet this word reveals the paradoxical way God has chosen to work power and salvation through weakness, rejection, and suffering. Hence the message of the cross becomes true wisdom and power for believers.

¹⁸The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are being destroyed. But it is the power of God for those of us who are being saved. ¹⁹It is written in scripture: *I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and I will reject the intelligence of the intelligent.* ²⁰Where are the wise? Where are the legal experts? Where are today's debaters? Hasn't God made the wisdom of the world foolish? ²¹In God's wisdom, he determined that the world wouldn't come to know him through its wisdom. Instead, God was pleased to save those who believe through the foolishness of preaching. ²²Jews ask for signs, and Greeks look for wisdom, ²³but we preach Christ crucified, which is a scandal to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles. ²⁴But to those who are called—both Jews and Greeks—Christ is God's power and God's wisdom. ²⁵This is because the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

²⁶Look at your situation when you were called, brothers and sisters! By ordinary human standards not many were wise, not many were powerful, not many were from the upper class. ²⁷But God chose what the world considers foolish to shame the wise. God chose what the world considers weak to shame the strong. ²⁸And God chose what the world considers low-class and low-life—what is considered to be nothing—to reduce what is considered to be something to nothing. ²⁹So no human being can brag in God's presence. ³⁰It is because of God that you are in Christ Jesus. He

became wisdom from God for us. This means that he made us righteous and holy, and he delivered us.³¹ This is consistent with what was written: *The one who brags should brag in the Lord!*



FAITH FORMATION

Confirmation: Slavery and the Bible

This week in confirmation, our students engaged with a challenging and vital topic: **Slavery and the Bible**. The lesson focused on how Scripture was historically used both to defend and to dismantle the institution of slavery, especially in the American context.

Sunday School: Seeking God's Guidance This morning, our Sunday School students learned about **Matthias the Apostle**. After Judas left the group, the disciples didn't just pick a replacement at random—they turned to God in prayer for guidance. The children learned that just as God led the disciples to Matthias, we can always turn to God in prayer whenever we have important decisions to make in our own lives.

REFLECTION AND PRAYER

Questions for Reflection

How do we live in hope of a reality we cannot yet see or, at best, catch only fleeting glimpses? Where in your community's life of prayer and service do you see instances of God's justice, peace, and healing? Then give thanks, and ask God, where am I being called to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly into all blessedness in the ordinary course of my day?

Household Prayer: Morning

Blessed God, I yearn to see your vision of justice, love, and peace made real for me this day. Open my eyes to the way of love that I may see your brilliant light shining into the hidden places of my heart and the darkened corners of the world. Amen.

Household Prayer: Evening

Loving God, you led me in the way of life this day and now call me to the way of rest. I give thanks for your light that illuminated my path today. Now, it is night. As you beckon me to enter into

holy darkness where I am one with you in your realm of uncreated light, I open to you in peace. Amen.

Theological Reflection

The beatitudes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount have sometimes been used as "shoulds"—you should be meek, pure in heart, a peacemaker, so that you will receive a blessing from God. But Jesus' words offer us an opportunity to see how God blesses those who are doing their best to live out their faith in an imperfect world. We are all the people Jesus names, at one time or another. God blesses us as we go about our lives sharing Jesus' love to a world that desperately needs it.



What does it mean to come home after everything has changed?

These two books are often neglected in the church, but they offer a gritty, honest look at a community attempting to reconstruct its life, its safety, and its faith after a period of intense trauma. In this six-session overview, we will explore:

- **The Bravery of the Unknown:** What it takes to enter uncomfortable new spaces.



- **The Power of the Word:** How a community shifts its foundation from a physical building to the living Word of God.

- **The Crisis of the "Other":** Tough questions about identity, exclusion, and who truly "belongs".
- **Walls and Justice:** Nehemiah's dual mission to provide physical security while demanding economic justice for the poor.

Whether these scriptures are brand new to you or you are looking for a fresh perspective, come and discover how these ancient stories of "rebuilding" speak directly to our lives today.
